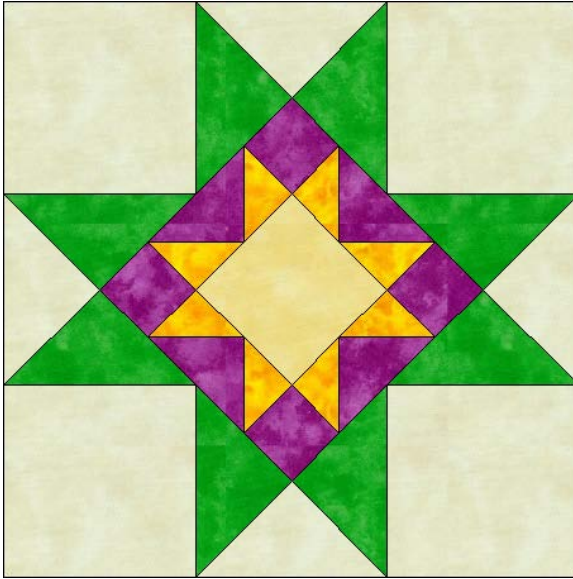


Block #1 – 12” finished



Cutting Instructions:

Fabric 1:

4 – 4-1/2” squares. (D)

1 – 5-3/16” square – cut on the diagonal twice so you have 4 triangles. (G)

Fabric 4:

4 – 1-15/16” squares. (F)

2 – 2-7/8” squares – cut on the diagonal once so you have 4 triangles. (B)

Fabric 6:

2 – 5-3/16” squares – cut on the diagonal twice so you have 8 triangles (C).

Fabric 7:

1 – 3-5/16” square. (E)

Fabric 8:

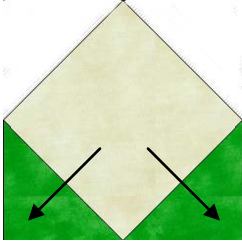
2 – 3-3/16” squares – cut on the diagonal twice so you have 8 triangles. (A)

Sewing Instructions:

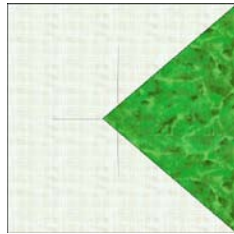
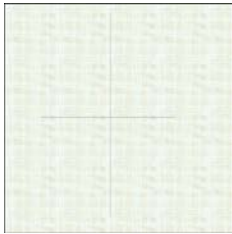
1. Add the **Fabric 8 triangles (A)** to the **Fabric 4 triangles (B)** to make 4 flying geese units.



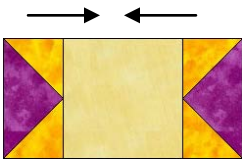
2. Add the **Fabric 6 triangles (C)** to the **Fabric 1 squares (D)**.



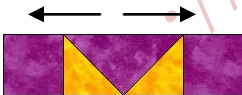
Tip: When adding triangles to a square, mark the center horizontal and vertical lines of the square. You can perfectly line up the point of your triangle. I usually just fold the square in half, finger press; fold it in half the other way, finger press and that's sufficient – I don't actually "mark" it.



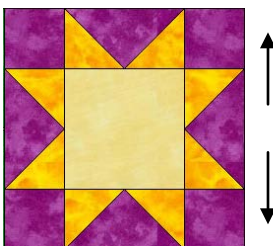
3. Add a flying geese unit to the top and bottom of the **3-5/16" square of Fabric 7 (E)**.



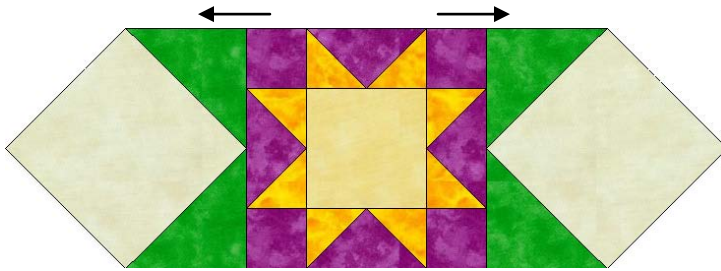
4. Add **1-15/16" squares of Fabric 4 (F)** to each side of two flying geese.



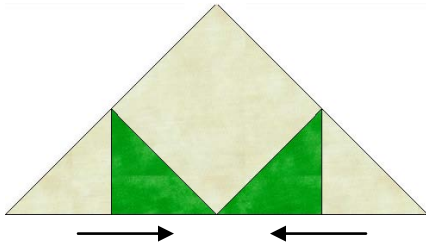
5. Sew those two units to the two remaining sides of the Fabric 7 square. (G)



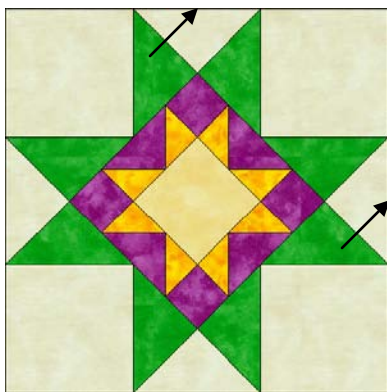
6. Sew units from Step 2 to the top and bottom of the star:



7. Sew a triangle from Fabric 2 to each end of a unit from Step 2. Make 2.



Finished Block:



Before putting it away:

(1) Mark the center on all four edges. Use a pencil, straight pin, blue marker – whatever you're comfortable using. It doesn't have to be a big mark – just a dot will do.



(2) Label the block as "Block #1". I used 3M Post-it Tape but use whatever works for you.
